EXQUISITE ENCOUNTERS

Exquisite Encounters is a deeply intimate group exhibition that embraces the quiet beauty of tradition, nature, and human connection amid a turbulent world. Featuring works that are small in scale yet rich in meaning, the artists find solace in landscapes, portraiture, and everyday materials, offering a refuge from chaos.

From Jan Snijder's timeless Dutch landscapes to Emily Bates' delicate etchings that capture fleeting light, each piece embodies a moment of stillness and reflection.

Remon de Jong's digital compositions evoke the warmth of 17th-century painting, while Inti Hernández's wooden sculptures invite viewers to uncover hidden meanings in everyday objects. Deirdre Mcloughlin's organic clay sculptures radiate the warmth of human touch, embodying resilience and tenderness.

Meanwhile, the visual artist duo Antonio José Guzmán & Iva Jankovic transform textiles and photographs into immersive narratives, echoing themes of displacement, resilience, and cultural memory. And Daniel Aguirre (Dao) says that "things are painted for what they mean, that we paint what is important to us, with that part of our sensitivity that aspires to transcendence".

truths, these artists respond not with spectacle,
but with quiet devotion,
patience, and a belief in the
power of art to illuminate a
path forward—one built on
collaboration, sincerity and
enduring hope.

















ABOUT THE SHOW

A group exhibition including Emily Bates, Inti Hernández, Remon de Jong, Deirdre McLoughlin, Jan Snijder, visual artist duo Antonio José Guzmán & Iva Jankovic and Daniel Aguirre (Dao) at De StadsSalon, Amsterdam, May 2025.

Exquisite Encounters assembles intimate and emotive works, created with heart in hand. Landscape, nature, portraiture are presented in their most tender form and scale, echoing domestic, human proportions. The materials and techniques used are rooted in everyday life, serving as testaments to a romantic joy found in tradition, in the small, the cherished, and the lingering warmth of home.

These artists cannot ignore a world in turmoil, a reality that is never still, always shifting, often wounding itself upon wounds yet unhealed. Yet, rather than dwell in despair, they find solace in what they have found along the way. They seek refuge in what captures their sensitive gaze, and in the act of focusing all possible energies upon these delicate discoveries, they rejoice. Rejoicing in the fall, they leave behind a trace; a record that takes shape in their works.




EMILY BATES

Emily Bates' intimate photographs from the series Silently, you stood and watched me fall, are printed as Toyobo chine-collé etchings, executed with impeccable technique to hold the most minute detail.

Recalling the miniature self-portraits of Rembrandt, whilst also referencing Asian scrolls and master work Pine Trees by Hasegawa Tohaku, they capture the fleeting shimmer of light on pools of water, and the elegance of distorted trees in the Brabants' landscape. In this natural dome, framed by the photographer's careful eye, the fallen are revealed: delicate leaves and branches that have relinquished their vibrant green, no longer holding the firmness of rebirth. Now, they begin their quiet journey back to the dust from which they came.

INTI HERNÁNDEZ

Inti Hernández presents a collection of "keys" that no longer hold any treasure. The very decision to carved them in wood symbolizes the emptiness of their functional role; a subtle metaphor for the fleeting nature of possession in a finite existence.

On the wall hangs an oil landscape, offering us a glimpse into the fate of an abandoned house; one left behind by an "Icarus" who failed to heed his father's warnings or to recognize the signs of a life leading him on an irreversible flight toward the burning sun. But here, back on the level of life (the level of the earth) a house is reclaimed by the forest, teaching us lessons of resilience and renewal.

Each spring, it buds anew. Each summer, it reaffirms itself. Each autumn, it deepens its roots. And each winter, it withdraws, reflecting on the triumphs of years past and gathering strength for the coming season, when tender green shoots will emerge once more, and the birds' song will remind us that it is time to begin again.

ANTONIO JOSE GUZMAN / IVA JANKOVIC

The visual artist duo Guzmán and Jankovic invite us to embark on what they call 'time travel perceptions': a visceral journey through genetics, indigo dye, silkscreen, and the legacies of colonialism in a world grappling with collapsing infrastructures. Their work resonates with movement and history, seamlessly blending ancient traditions with futuristic visions.

With a keen sensitivity to postcolonial issues and the complexities of human connection, Guzmán and Jankovic delve into the frictions and resistances born from migration and cultural exchange. Yet their art transcends confrontation, offering a different path forward; one where beauty becomes an act of defiance, a space for dialogue, and a catalyst for transformation. For them, aesthetics is not merely a tool but an invitation: an open door to deeper reflections on history, identity, and renewal."

Guzmán and Jankovic are supported by the Mondriaan Fonds and Amsterdam Fonds voor de Kunst.



DANIEL AGUIRRE (DAO)

Daniel Aguirre (Dao) paints his tango dancing shoes as a reflection of his belief that simplicity holds things that are not simple. These shoes, familiar yet symbolic, evoke the essence of the milonga: a space where courage and vulnerability moves toward an embrace that feels tender and seems real. His work is a reflection of himself, intimate and exposed, a testimony of a determined attitude that transcends modesty and insecurities, inhabiting with the soul what touches us, what moves us.

In essence, these shoes serve as a self-portrait. They are worn by Dao and tied to gazes, embraces, intense and sometimes true moments, with some woman. They represent powerful sensations revolving around the essential, some form of love; moments that fade when the music stops, leaving a lasting imprint on life, body, and soul.

DEIRDRE MCLOUGHLIN

It seems as if Deirdre McLoughlin's sculptures have chosen to retain the warmth bestowed by fire on clay, holding onto that precise moment when they embody the heat of a living body. Hips, elbows, and thighs, fragments of the human form, fold inward like knots, yet these knots do not constrain; they have been tied with softness, almost with tenderness.

Rather than restricting the body, they cradle it, helping it preserve its warmth, drawing in the glow of candlelight; the kind of light that accompanies intimate conversations, those whispered softly into the ear.







Van Damme has a strong focus on process-driven films, following individuals at pivotal moments in their lives. Her notable works include 'De School', 'Tussen Ouders en Kinderen', and 'Vét VMBO!'.
